#### I. Executive Summary:

Shree Swanra Integrated Community Development Center (SSICDC) Gorkha is a non-political, non-governmental and non-profit making community based organization established by young and energetic youths in 1987 AD. The Organization has been working continuously since its establishment with the poorest and downtrodden people who are typically the social outcaste, women, children and the disadvantaged group, in general, of different castes and races.

The overall program coverage of the organization are Community Health and Sanitation education, Maternal and Child Health Mobile clinic in coordination with DPHO(District Public Health Office), Sub-Health post, Health Post, conflict transformation and peace building, drinking water supply and sanitation, adult and child education, women empowerment, micro finance, farmers managed irrigation, income generation through agriculture and forest resource management, community managed infrastructures like wooden bridge building, child development, reproductive health, child and women rights, Gender issues and social inclusion.

It is one of the local levels leading NGO that has adopted participatory approaches in working with the marginalized families and communities in delivering developmental program in 56 Village Development Committees (VDCs) of Gorkha district. It has the privilege of being a community based, locally recognized for its goodwill and the image within the community. Presently the organization has an executive committee of 7 members and 56 general members in the most inclusive basis.

The organization has accomplished a number of project activites viz. Health and Sanitation Education, toilet construction, MCH mobile clinic in 25 VDCs, Integrated Community Development Program at 8 VDCs, Local Governance and Community Development Program (LGCDP) under DDC and Gorkha Municipality in Gorkha, Emergency Response Projects with the support of Save the Children International, Lutheran World Relief (LWR), Care Nepal in different VDCs of district.

Also the organization has implemented Hariyo Ban Program with the partnership of WWF Nepal funded by USAID, Hariyo Ban Program with the partnership of CARE Nepal funded by USAID, Hariyo Ban Program/ Windows of Opportunity with the partnership of WWF Nepal funded by USAID, Improved Cooking Stove Program with the partnership of DDC Gorkha/ AEPC, Emergency Response Programs with the partnership of CARE Nepal, Save the Children and Lutheran World Relief, Catholic Relief Services, United Nation Development Program (UNDP) and Poverty Alleviation Fund Program.

#### 2. Background:

On 25 April 2015, a 7.8 magnitude earthquake struck Nepal with its epicenter in Gorkha District, around 81 km northwest of the country capital, Kathmandu. The earthquake struck on Saturday at 11:56 local time when schools were not in session. The catastrophic earthquake was followed by more than 60 aftershocks greater than magnitude 4.0 by May 12 when a second 7.3 magnitude earthquake occurred on the same fault as the first but further east in Dolakha District. In some areas the second earthquake caused more damage than the original as it caused previously damaged buildings to collapse. In total more than 300 aftershocks greater than magnitude 4.0 and four aftershocks greater than magnitude 6.0 have been recorded to date. As of 7th July 2015, the Government of Nepal reported 8,712 deaths and 22,493 injured people. It is estimated that the

earthquake affected 8 million people (over one third of Nepal's population) in 39 districts, in four of the five development Regions of Nepal (Far Western region has not been affected).

There are 14 most affected (priority) districts, namely Gorkha, Bhaktapur, Dhading, Dolakha, Kathmandu, Kavrepalanchok, Lalitpur, Makwanpur, Nuwakot, Okhaldhunga, Rasuwa, Ramechhap, Sindhuli and Sindhupalchok.

Immediately after the earthquake, SSICDC, Gorkha set up an Emergency Response Activities in different sectors. After the earthquake schools were badly affected. Most of the school buildings were totally collapsed by the earthquake. It was very difficult situation for government to reopen school and implement the curriculum of the year. SSICDC Gorkha and Save the children signed the agreement under Neal Earthquake Response Education in Emergency program. SSICDC started to implement emergency response in Education sector from 1 July 2015 to 29 feb.2016 partnership with Save the Children under UNICEF/USAID grant. The organization then initiated different activities under livelihood, health, nutrition, shelter, WASH for recovery stage.

- Recover the livelihoods & economy of affected People at community level through agro based infrastructure.
- Support to strengthen and diversify the livelihood opportunities of the poorest HHs in order to reinforce their capacities to cope with future shocks.
- Provide durable and sustainable water supply in the communities which are facing severe scarcity of water.
- Empowering the people of community with their active participation in water supply and sanitation project.
- Raising Hygiene promotion behavior to the community.
- Construct household level latrine and provide knowledge regarding handling of the water supply scheme's structures and HH latrine as well.

The Hariyo Ban Program, funded by USAID and implemented by a consortium of WWF, CARE, NTNC and FECOFUN with WWF as the lead, aims to reduce adverse impacts of climate change and threats to biodiversity in Nepal. It works on three core interwoven components - biodiversity conservation, sustainable landscapes and climate change adaptation with livelihoods, gender and social inclusion being important cross cutting themes. Hariyo Ban Program is being implemented in two landscapes of Nepal - Terai Arc Landscapes (TAL) and Chitwan-Annapurna Landscape (CHAL), complemented by enabling policy support at the national level. SSICDC Gorkha implemented the program in Gorkha district from June 2013 with the support of WWF Nepal.

#### **Background:**

The aim of the proposed project is to "meet the immediate and medium-term food security and livelihood needs of the most vulnerable earthquake-affected households in Gorkha district. This will be achieved through the implementation of mutually reinforcing interventions that support at least 850 disaster affected households (HHs) to recover their livelihoods and establish coping mechanisms to meet their food security by the end of the project.





#### 7.0 Monitoring and Evaluation:

Monitoring and evaluation are the key components to run the project strictly and effectively as per the plan and objectives to attain its goal. Monitoring before, during and after the cash distribution is essential to ensure the utilization of cash in temporary shelter construction. Evaluation, on the other hand, provides the succinct idea regarding whether the project activities are towards its objectives or not. Also evaluation helps to prepare the most effective plan for the further action.

The organization has taken every measures regarding monitoring and evaluation during cash distribution to achieve defined objectives of the project. Mr. Sita Ram Shrestha (Executive Director-SSICDC), Program Managers, Executive Board Members, Donor's and VDC secretary from government part has frequently monitored the project activities to make the distribution activity project more effective and reliable. The staffs adjusted in this project have also played a fundamental role in monitoring during the project implementation period.

#### 8.0 Issues, Opportunities, Challenge and lesson learned:

#### **Issues:**

The project has addressed the most contemporary issues including the followings.

- I) The problem of temporary shelter has solved.
- II) The helplessness feeling of the public has reduced to some extent.
- III) It has promoted in food security for many affected peoples.

#### **Opportunities:**

Several opportunities have been brought forward by this project and these can be stated as under:

- I) NGOs goodwill and image towards the public will be rapidly risen.
- II) Its service area will be broadened.
- III) The new experience regarding the emergency response will be availed.

NGOs goodwill and public image, its current programs and very good relations among concern stakeholders support to implementation the program smoothly and rapidly growing community awareness towards natural resources and biodiversity conservation, sustainable landscape management and climate change. Media of Gorkha 4 FM and two local level news papers are broadcasting and printing regularly the news regarding Hariyo Ban Program of Gorkha which supports to build supporting environment for the smooth implementation of the program. The coverage of this FM radios are about all over the Gorkha and 22 districts of Nepal.

#### Challenges:

The major challenges during the implementation are described below shortly:

- Coropral punishment were still prevelant in the committee.parents were orientated about the good parenting skills and teachers on positive discipline through parents and vcpc initiatives.
- II) Issues of child marriage prevelant .Parents Inititatives and VCPC initiatives incorporated the issues of child marriage to sensitize the issues of child marriage.
- III) Monitoreing and sustainability of CSS activity was a challenge.CSS management committee was formed which ensure the sustainability and monitors trhe effectiveness of the css activity

The major challenges to implementation this program mainly for plantation is geographically remoteness; travel in monsoon season to remote rural areas. To address this challenge we adopt the mitigation measure to provide the responsibility to related VDCs field level staffs, social mobilizer and peer educators. Hence SSICDC Gorkha manages full times and a part time staffs nominated to plan, implement, mentor and monitor with backstopping of the program regular basis. Completed activities of the Hariyo Ban Program were distribute by Mega earthquake 2072 like M/ICS installed, cardamom, plantation, IGA, broom grass, bamboo and road side plantation, Plastic

tunnel distribution, and vegetable cultivation, activities etc. Now we are smoothly stating the activities.

To address the challenges come across during the project implementation, we adopted the mitigation measures providing the responsibilities to related VDCs field level staffs, social mobilizers and distributors deploying them in the project VDC. Also, SSICDC Gorkha managed full time and a part time staffs to prepare plan, implement and mentor and monitor the Cash Distribution project more effectively and efficiently.

#### Lesson learned:

Though, the project was entirely new with different characteristics, we, SSICDC team, accomplished the project sincerely, timely and effectively with perceiving some enhanced lessons which are noted below shortly.

- I) Use of local material like bamboo, wood is better and faster to fulfill the need during emergency.
- II) Playing materials support have played vital role in School's children to make regularity at School and staying full time in School.
- III) It showed that child centered activities are effectiveness to ensure the rights of child by child's own efforts.
- IV) Learning matrials developed learning environment then the theoretical methods.
- V) The beneficiary's lists most be verified in advance.
- VI) The distribution plans have to be prepared in actual basis selecting the most comfortable point for the beneficiaries.
- VII) The time table should be prepared for the beneficiaries so that they might not wait for a long time to receive the cash.
- VIII) The enough human resource should be used to speedy work.

Green enterprise development and IGA support program help to reduce the human pressure on the forest. Attention should be gone on conflict between human being and wildlife. Separate business plan should be prepare for each Enterprise and Income Generation Programs. In CAPA or IGA program bee keeping Musroom cultivation activities are the best enterprise because it does not need plot of land and support to promote biodiversity from small scale support.
